Juvenile Accountability Block Grants (JABG) Program

The Juvenile Accountability Block Grants (JABG) program is a state-administered federal funding stream that provides funding to counties to reduce juvenile crime and improve outcomes for <u>justice-involved youth</u> through seventeen types of accountability-based programs enumerated by the federal Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP). These accountability-based programs may include coordinating re-entry systems and programs for justice-involved youth, developing and implementing alternative court and restorative justice programs, maintaining school safety and gang-prevention programs, and more. Programs and more.

State funding amounts are determined by local criminal justice expenditures and the level of violent crime. 75% of the federal funding must go to eligible local units of government (e.g., counties). Local government must pay a 10% match on all JABG expenditures except in the case of construction of juvenile corrections facilities, which requires a 50% match. States and local units of government must have advisory boards to carry out the granting process.

While JABG was originally a fairly robust funding source with an authorization of \$249 million dollars in 2002, it has subsequently dwindled. No federal funding has been allocated to JABG since 2014.³ To date, there continue to be attempts to reauthorize JABG on the federal level.⁴
