The Albuquerque Police Department recently participated in an innovative training program put on by Fight Crime: Invest in Kids, Police Training Institute (PTI). The program, Connecting Youth & Communities with Law Enforcement (CYCLE) is a unique opportunity to provide high level learning for our officers while engaging community youth in positive engagement with police.

The PTI team does so much more than just teach a class to law enforcement.
